Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE)

Sexual exploitation is "someone taking advantage of you sexually for their own benefit. Through threats, bribes, violence, humiliation or by telling you that they love you, they will have the power to get you to do sexual things for their own or other people's enjoyment." (the nia project)



Key messages:

- CSE is child abuse and the response should be the same as for any other safeguarding concern.
- There is legislation to protect children up to the age of 18 from CSE. Even when they reach the age of 16 a young person cannot consent to exploitation. Consent is defined as having the freedom and capacity to choose. Any person intoxicated with drugs or alcohol does not have the capacity to consent to sexual activity.
- Usually a young person will not identify that they are a victim of CSE. We all need to be aware of
 potential vulnerabilities and risk indicators in order to protect children and young people. All
 organisations have a shared responsibility to protect, safeguard and promote the welfare of victims who
 maybe/are being sexually exploited.
- Supporting a victim of CSE requires persistence, patience and consistency.
- If you are concerned about a young person or a situation there are a number of ways in which this can be reported. **Say something.**
